PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

This REU is designed to help prepare participants to study emergent social-cultural research and resource management issues faced by communities interested in heritage as a key cultural resource in areas such as quality of life programs and policies; education; tourism; historic preservation; youth activities; civic and environmental empowerment; and neighborhood revitalization. It is conducted in collaboration with groups from Tampa Bay area communities (i.e., Sulphur Springs) and designated National historic sites throughout the United States.

PURPOSE

The broader aim is to train students in qualitative research approaches (ethnographic/ethnohistorical analysis, oral history, participant observation, and ethnographic interview) as key tools for researchers interested in engaging in social and cultural issues from a comparative, holistic, critical, and community-centered perspective. Research skills students will gain in this project are applicable to a range of fields of work and study, including education, business, civic, medical, and environmental.

The program, which includes both coursework and student participation in a selected research project, is based on a philosophy of public or community interaction & partnership, active learning, and collaboration with team members in working towards completion of specific deliverables. Students will learn to work in academic and non-academic settings and manage the demands and expectations of each as budding research professionals.

Program Details

Students will be active participants on an ongoing heritage research project in Sulphur Springs or at a designated NPS National Historic Site. Research will include (but is not limited to): collecting oral histories; conducting ethnographic and ethnohistorical research using a range of ethnographic techniques and audio visual options; creating multi-media educational materials; participating in community heritage preservation meetings &activities; website design; collecting and preserving historic photographs; participating in historic building designation fieldwork, and doing library & archival research as defined by the Project PI. Student research will be supervised by: Dr. Antoinette Jackson (USF) with tbd graduate student researchers/mentors and community partners.

Number of Project Teams: 3 (Sulphur Springs-Nicodemus, KS-Plains, GA) Number of Students: enrollment will be capped at 15 students with no more than 6 students per project team.

Tuition:

All students will be enrolled for 8-9 credit hours (ANT 4930-55490; ANT 4930-55491;IDH 4910).

Student Fees:

In addition to the standard tuition and fees payable to the Registrar's Office, students on project teams traveling outside of Tampa, FL should budget an additional \$350.00 to cover the cost of meals, travel, and other miscellaneous supplies.

Travel and Lodging:

USF student participants on project teams traveling to Nicodemus, KS and Plains, GA will be eligible for travel grants for up to \$500.00 through the Office of Undergraduate Research.

APPLICATION INFORMATION

A limited number of students will be selected for this REU. Each REU Scholar will be paired with a faculty mentor and/or graduate student researcher in the Department of Anthropology. Preference will be given to those students whose research experience relates to that of the faculty or graduate student mentor. Typically, students will be considered for the program if they have begun their coursework in their academic major, completed a minimum of 60 hours, and have an expected graduation date no earlier than August 2010. Preference will be given to students who have completed a research methods course and/or who have research experience.

USF Students who successfully complete this REU and maintain a minimum of 3.0 GPA will receive a stipend of \$250.00 to \$500.00 from the Office of Undergraduate Research. The stipend amount is dependent on the grade earned.

Application must be received no later than March 31st, 2010 with status notification by **April 15th**. *TO APPLY*

CURRICULUM

The maximum of 9-credit hour program, to which any undergraduate may apply, consists of two courses plus an Applied/Directed Research Project

a) **Researching American Culture** —ethnographic analysis in American Cultural Settings: What is American culture and how do we conduct research in an American cultural context?

3 credit hrs—ANT 4930-55490 MWF 8a-10:20a - Summer A

b) Qualitative Research Tools & Methods (Emphasis on Community Heritage research)
Tools and strategies for conducting research in a community/neighborhood settings.
Focuss on Community Heritage research and preservation projects using
Ethnographic/Ethnohistorical Analysis, including Oral History, Visual, and Ethnographic Interview methods.

3 credit hours—ANT 4930-55491 MWF 12:30-2:50 - Summer A

c) Applied/Directed Research Project

Students will be partnered with a Project PI, a graduate student mentor, and a community expert. They will participate in a designated community heritage project.

2-3 credit hours Summer A/B

1) Sulphur Springs Heritage Project – active participation in an ongoing community and heritage research project including (but not limited to): collecting oral histories using a range of ethnographic techniques and audio visual options; creating multimedia educational materials; participating in community heritage preservation meetings &activities; website design; collecting and preserving historic photographs; participating in historic building designation fieldwork, and doing library & archival research in support of the Sulphur Springs Museum and Heritage Center. Student research will be directed by: Dr. Antoinette Jackson (USF), Dr. Susan Greenbaum (USF), and tbd graduate student researchers/mentors; and community partners (i.e., Mrs. Norma Robinson).

Collaborative Research and Community Empowerment—active participation in community research projects focused on heritage preservation and quality of life activities through folk art and youth programs; capacity building activities with the Sulphur Springs Action League Neighborhood Association, and participation in community engagement and empowerment programs aimed at facilitating cohesion among diverse population segments. For example, students may participate in longstanding work to aid with the preservation and organization of Sociedad la Unión Martí-Maceo in Ybor City, a historic Afro-Cuban organization and other tbd Tampa Bay area community projects. Student research will be directed by: Dr. Antoinette Jackson (USF), Dr. Susan Greenbaum (USF), or tbd graduate student researchers/mentors (i.e., Lance Arney) and a designated community partner.

2) Nicodemus National Historic Site, Kansas

Selected students will work with faculty advisor and project PI, Dr. Antoinette Jackson, and graduate students mentors on a National Park Service funded heritage research and preservation project in Nicodemus, Kansas.

Estimated student cost: \$250.00-\$500.00 –Research field trip dates: June 12-25 to Nicodemus, Kansas.

Projects Goals/Objectives:

- The project is meant to increase the understanding and appreciation by the NPS for the people, places and organizations that contributed materially to the creation and continued existence of Nicodemus as the only remaining western town established by African-Americans during the Reconstruction period following the Civil War, and to assist the NPS in the preservation of related resources and in the interpretation of Nicodemus for the education and enjoyment of present and future generations.
- This project originated from the desire of NPS to better understand the history of the Nicodemus community and the legislative requirement for the NPS to work cooperatively with the affiliated Nicodemus-founders' descendants.

3) Jimmy Carter National Historic Site—Plains, Georgia

Selected students will work with faculty advisor and project PI, Dr. Antoinette Jackson, and graduate students mentors on a National Park Service funded heritage research and preservation project in Plains, Georgia.

Estimated cost: \$150.00-\$300.00 - Research field trip dates: 1) May 25- June 8 and 2) July 2 - July 17 (opt) to Plains, GA.

Projects Goals/Objectives:

• The Jimmy Carter National Preservation District includes part of the town of Plains and its environs. The Jimmy Carter National Historic Site and Preservation District was established by Congress in 1987 to interpret President Jimmy Carter's life and presidency in relation to Plains, Georgia. The park preserves the resources associated with this story. In essence, the site commemorates and interprets the rural southern culture of Plains, Georgia, that revolves around farming, church and school, and that had a large influence in molding the character and in shaping the political policies of the 39th President of the United States. The proposed project is an ethnohistorical profile of the historic African American community of Archery, which was the location of the boyhood farm of President Jimmy Carter.

In general, student research will be directed by: tbd USF faculty and graduate student mentors/researchers. It is anticipated that students will attend classes twice a week and then be assigned to a faculty member and/or graduate student to work on a specific research project in a local community setting. Each student will complete a research project assignment and paper in partial fulfillment of the requirements for the program and prepare a presentation of their research findings and activities for the REU's concluding colloquium at the end of the summer session.

Students will also be encouraged to participate in community civic and social activities as well as University sponsored workshops and programs.
